Past, Present, Future

The loving stewardship of what is now our neighborhood is nothing new. For thousands of years before the Colonial Investment Company broke ground on the Heights in 1910—before John Muir described the Great Valley of California as "the floweriest piece of world I ever walked"—the Nisenan people summered in Sacramento, collecting acorns into woven, willow granaries.

As you drive, bike, and walk around our neighborhood, take note of the native oaks of Colonial Heights, and wonder what person or creature planted them, and when. Imagine past iterations of the landscape, as compared to now. What past and present damages need acknowledgement and mending? What seeds can we plant today that will bring joy in the future?



Past, Present, Future



Colonial Heights was founded in 1910 as Sacramento's ideal subdivision. Now made up of about 700 homes, the diverse neighborhood encompasses the space between Stockton Boulevard, 14th Avenue, 22nd Avenue, and 58th Street.

Mayor's Monarch Pledge

The monarch butterfly is an iconic species whose western populations have **declined by 99%** in recent years.

Through the **National Wildlife Federation's Mayors' Monarch Pledge**, U.S. cities, municipalities, and other communities are committing to **create habitat** for the monarch butterfly and pollinators, and to **educate residents** about how they can make a difference at home and in their community.

Monarch butterfly conservation is so important to our community that the **CHNA voted unanimously to ask the mayor sign the pledge** and lead Sacramento in taking this public, powerful action.

Mayor McCarty has signed the pledge and

has committed to engaging Sacramento residents in creating more native pollinator habitat throughout the city.

We were lucky enough to move to this house 6 years ago, and the garden was basically a blank slate. In that time we have used the city rebate program to convert our front lawn to drought-tolerant plants from California and Australia, developed a vegetable garden and small orchard, and continue to develop more areas of our large space to include herb plantings, additional native plants, and cut flower areas. We are plant fiends who want to grow it all while conserving water and recycling as many materials as possible in the garden.

Accessibility: Most of the garden can be viewed from a 3ft wide decomposed granite path that is suitable for walkers and strollers

Xeriscaping Goals (Un-hosted point of interest)

A xeric environment is one that contains very little moisture. Xeriscaping, therefore, is the intentional design of a garden that will not need irrigation, even in the extreme heat of summer in the Great Valley of California. This xeriscaped front yard was designed and installed by Mantis Gardens. Stop by to oooh and aaah over the diverse array of aloes, mangaves, aeoniums, sedums, agaves, opuntias, rock purslane, and many other cacti and succulents!

Infinity Gardens at the Bungalow

Welcome to our Infinity Gardens – so named as tending (the gardens), turning (of the seasons), and delighting (in the wonder of nature) are endless endeavors!

When we landed in Colonial Heights in 2018 the Bermuda grass 'sprawl' all around the house was devoid of flowers, fruit, and healthy soil. Our first seasons were devoted to rehabilitating the neglected soil, improving drainage, and installing water wise irrigation. We designed the gardens for up-close interaction and enjoyment with stepping stone paths, arbors and raised beds. The gardens continue to evolve as water-wise, pollinator friendly, and nectar-source native California plants replace some of our thirstier friends. Zinnias, cosmos, gomphrena, and other beloved annuals will always have a home here – along with summer vegetables, berries fruit trees, and herbs. Our Monarch Meadow is an officially designated "Monarch Waystation," with five types of native milkweed and nectar plants thriving throughout the seasons. Every day in the Infinity Gardens amaze as we enjoy a perpetual parade of wildlife. Stroll on over – pause for a bit and take in the wonder of it all!

Accessibility: mostly accessible except for one corner of the backyard.



(Un-hosted point of interest)

We moved to Colonial Heights in 2016 and almost immediately went to work taking out the lawn to plant a native Garden. What you see now is the evolution of that project. While we couldn't bear to part with some of the existing non-natives, most of the blooms you see hail from our magnificent California. From the looming yellow Flannel Bush to the drooping blue Ray Hartman and Dark Star ceanothi, to the abundant phacelia and poppies that simply self-sow each year, our wild, crowded front yard is in constant flux, and we enjoy seeing its progress season by season and year by year. We hope you enjoy it as well, during one of its most bombastic times.

What Will Happen is Anyone's Guess

(Un-hosted point of interest)

We moved here in the summer of 2016, & inherited a jungle of shrubs, trees, & a pollinator desert of a lawn. I slowly removed & pruned shrubs, replacing them with random bulbs, annuals, & perennials—whatever caught my eye at the nursery. I resisted the advice of my green-thumbed mother, & paid no heed to water or light requirements, or novel ideas such as "soil fertility."

Enter: March 2020. I channeled all my pandemic grief and anxiety into murdering my lawn. Over the past 5 years, we have added various raised beds (now on our second iteration), garden mounds, and irrigation (my sworn enemy). I developed a minor obsession with native plants & have converted the side parking strip to almost exclusively include California natives, none of them thirsty

& all of them sun-loving. This year there are many self-seeded interlopers as well (looking at you, sweet peas and nasturtiums).

Most of the plants in the raised beds were grown from seed this year, with a few existing perennials and some fillers from the nursery.

Welcome to our quirky, evolving garden oasis! In 2021, we transformed our front and back yards through the city's lowwater landscape program, replacing thirsty grass with a tapestry of native, drought-tolerant plants-most of which are still thriving and doing their wild, beautiful thing. A slightly-too-generous dirt delivery sparked an explosion of flower pots this year, adding unexpected bursts of color everywhere. The backyard hosts four keyhole garden beds, a small orchard of trees (maple, pear, lemon, orange, and peach), and a growing collection of odd treasures rescued from Buy Nothing finds and local dump piles. We love enjoying breakfast outdoors on crisp spring mornings, even if the yard's gotten a little overgrown lately.. This garden tour is just the motivation we needed to roll up our sleeves and spend more time outside. Come wander-there's always something blooming, buzzing, or just a little weird to discover.

The Plot Thickens

We started stewarding this plot when our young family moved to Colonial Heights in 2019. Since that first summer we've killed the lawn, planted fruit trees & native plants, raised flocks of chickens, hosted monarch butterflies, & and grown edible mushrooms. Features include a *hugelkultur* installation & two DIY greywater irrigation systems.

Accessibility: three steps and narrow paths prevent full wheelchair access to the backyard.

Come explore this DIY backyard, which features both a rain garden and a keyhole garden. The rain garden is designed to collect rainwater from roofs, driveways, and lawns, allowing it to soak into the ground. This reduces erosion, filters pollutants, and helps refill groundwater and local waterways. The keyhole garden is a raised circular bed with a compost basket in the center. As compost breaks down, it feeds the surrounding plants, requires less watering, making it an efficient way to grow food in a small space. Both gardens are easy to maintain and fairly easy DIY projects.

Accessibility: A gravel path surrounds most of the rain garden and may be difficult to navigate for those using wheelchairs, walkers, or for those with other mobility challenges. A paved sidewalk beyond the gravel provides an accessible route to view the rain garden and reach the keyhole garden.

Wind-sewn wildflowers, fragrance from sweet peas, narcissus, mint, lavender, and Mexican marigold fill the air. Drought-tolerant perennials, desert willow, maples, redbud, manzanita, chaste trees and more provide color in the fall, shade in the summer. This garden rocks: winding stone pathways, raised river rock beds, dry riverbed. Insects, beneficial and not, find their way here. Baby, baby, it's a wild world. This garden is NOT a tidy English-style garden.

L'Orticello

Thanks for visiting my garden! When I moved here in '95 there was not much other than a few mature trees. My goal was to have screened privacy, flowers for cutting, some fruit trees, birdsong, and Mediterranean plantings and herbs. ~~ In the front area, I replaced the miserable lawn with beds of herbs and rock rose in topiary "green mounds", plumbago trellis, periwinkle bed, and Gravenstein apples.

~~ In the center area around the house is a lavender bed, with the compost station beyond the partition fence, on the east side; a shaded woodland-planting area on the west side; and two larger beds (currently in transition to more kitchen-garden plantings) beyond the patio.

~~ The far back area is the newest garden, with roses and peonies (and eventually with blooming herbs filling in between). Leading to the new garden are citrus trees with naturalized Spring bulbs and herbs.

The best gardening advice I've ever heard is to figure out what you can grow and grow lots of that! It's been my guiding principle ever since.

Backyard Living

When we first acquired our home in 2016, the yard was a blank slate with two established trees, weedy grass, and a large dirt pile. Inspired by a vision of a tranquil retreat, our aim was to fashion an outdoor space that felt like a natural extension of our home. The transformation has been a labor of love and a lesson in letting go and letting the yard speak to us.

We have tried to create year-round interest by emphasizing foliage colors and textures. You will find velvety gray-green lamb's ear, red-tinged cuphea, a deep purple smoke bush, coral bells in shades of peach and red, a golden pineapple sage, and other foliageforward plants. Our rose garden has several notable varieties. This spring, you will find several perennials in bloom, such as sea lavender, penstemon, and sages. We hope visitors will enjoy the space as much as we do.

Accessibility: There is a long hard dirt path from the front to the backyard, but there are no hardscaped paths in the backyard. It is mostly lawn.

My goal with the garden is to provide a supportive space for pollinators and natives while allowing for the joy of growing food for my family and flowers for our table. Substantial plantings of sages, grasses, and other native plants occupy our front and the central portion of the back garden. Around them, we grow classic Sacramento crops - tomatoes, peppers, and melons. I find a particular happiness in growing plants that my young daughter can harvest herself like peas, cherry tomatoes, and carrots. Flowers are strewn throughout wherever a splash of color feels right. I employ fully organic techniques with minimal

pesticides or other chemical treatments, relying on natural processes to support the plants.

The garden is my happy space, a forever to-do list, and an endless source of inspiration.
